Take the Time this Summer to Worship with Your Family

Summer is here and Kids LINK is over and you may be wondering...how do we worship with our kids? Or maybe if you're honest...Why do have to worship with our kids?

TIPS FOR PARENTS

- Allow enough time to get settled and have bathroom visits before the service begins.
- Sit towards the front of the worship space! While this may seem counter-intuitive, children who can see easily will be more engaged in what is going on. You can always sit on the end of the row so that you can make an easy exit if necessary.
- Introduce your children to people nearby.
- Encourage children to participate by sharing their own financial resources.
- Children learn worship etiquette by participation feel free to whisper to children to teach explain the meaning of difficult words in music or liturgy. Share your own positive feelings about the various parts of the worship service.
- Remember, it is hard for children to sit for a long time. Allow children to sit or kneel on the floor and use the pew or chairs as a desk if necessary. Feel free to pick up a Children's bulletin or a Busy Bag as you enter the worship space; both will help keep your child occupied as you worship together.
- Bring your child forward for a blessing during Communion—this can be a very meaningful part of the service for both of you.
- Talk about worship at home during the week ("That's like what the Pastor said during the sermon" or ... "Do you remember the story we heard in church?") This reinforces what they have learned.
- Talk about the prayer concerns and pray for them during the week.
- During the 9:30 am service we'll offer KidZone for kids ages 3 years 5 years this summer. Kids will leave worship with a parent right before the sermon begins and get picked up at the end of the service in the Isaiah room. For younger siblings, Kids Care will be available.

We always welcome families worshiping together.

TIPS FOR THE CONGREGATION

- Remember the commitment we have as a congregation to the children worshiping with us. As a part of the service of baptism, the congregation commits to helping each person grow in faith.
- Greet the children around you before and after worship, not just their parents, make them feel like an important part of the worship service.
- Hand offering baskets to children, not over their heads!
- Make it a goal to learn one child's name in this congregation, and greet that child by name each time you see them in worship.
- Understand when parents need to take younger children out of worship or to the nursery and then return to worship. Make them feel welcome when they return, not self-conscious!
- Have patience with the learning process; sometimes children will be restless and active
 in worship. Remember, we are all children of God, and learning how to worship is important. As a congregation we should help support, not hinder, families in honoring the
 promises they made at baptism.
- Compliment children (and their parents) when children have participated and listened attentively during the service.

Our children, who love so freely, need to be in worship, and they need to learn how to express their love to God. It's important to God, it should be important to us, and it is important to the future of the church as we know it. Will it always be easy? Maybe not... because just like everything else, our children are counting on us, their parents and their congregation, to teach them. It means that we can endure the goldfish in the pews, and the occasional loud comments with grace and the understanding that having them there is pleasing to God and part of our responsibility in fulfilling the promises we all made at their baptism.



New Beginnings!

"And the one sitting on the throne said, 'Look, I am making everything new!' And then He said to me, 'Write this down, for what I tell you is trustworthy and true.'" ~ Revelation 21:5

One of the themes that pervades every corner of the Bible is the idea of newness, a clean slate, a fresh beginning, the opportunity to start anew. In some cases the context has to do with the amazing forgiveness that God offers us through the work of His Son Jesus; I think of the wonderful promise in Isaiah where God assures us that He will make the crimson stains of our sins white as snow, so there is a daily aspect to these new beginning.

As we step into the new, may we always remember who we have been as a church, a people shaped by the mission of Jesus to go and make disciples; people given distinct values that help to make our church unique; a people who have never been afraid to step into the new for the sake of reaching those who are far from God.

The History of Our Church WLC Scrapbook

Mark Shepperd was hired as our first full-time Minister of Music in 1990. He will have retired from that position by the time you read this. But before Mark blessed us with his talents, Rhoda Pfotenhauer (wife of our founding pastor, Paul) played piano and led singing during the early years. Various lay people directed the senior choir [photo] including Elaine Nygren and Trudy Scholten.

- One day in 1990 the church organ quit working. Gene Neudahl had kept the old electronic organ running by replacing vacuum tubes the size of light bulbs. The end finally arrived.
- An organ fund was started, but it was decided that the installation of a new organ was not possible without expensive remodeling. WLC was bursting at the seams, and city growth was expected to explode.
 - So an organ study became a growth study, which became a building program, which led to a new sanctuary which included space for our beautiful pipe organ!
- The story of the pipe organ fund: Pastor Paul caught a large swordfish on a family trip. When he discovered their fishing guide was not donating the fish to an orphanage as he said, the Pfotenhauers hauled the swordfish away in the back of a truck and sold it. This "fish money" was the first donation to the organ fund.







An Update On Multiply

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." - Acts 1:8

2018 is off to a strong start financially around the *Multiply* initiative. Over the next several months we will be watching the finances closely looking for new trends in giving and so forth. As we do, it is important to remember that *Multiply* is a two year 8.4 million dollar initiative that includes everything in our budget. Remember *Multiply* is one fund, meaning that everything we do ministry wise is included in *Multiply*. Here are a few updates from each bucket:

MULTISITE INVESTMENT - \$1.1 Million

We will be proactive in using the blessings God has given us to multiply new campuses for His glory.

- We continue to pay the operating expenses of Liberty Ridge and Oak Hill.
- We are setting aside funds for future multisite ministry as well as for a future permanent location for Liberty Ridge.
- God is continuing to open doors for conversations that could lead to new ministry sites for WLC.

FOCUSED MISSIONS - \$1.1 Million

We will support the work of God's Kingdom by multiplying new church plants and leaders, partnering with developing communities and feeding the hungry.

- We are excited to be partnering with the Makane Yesus Lutheran Church in Ethiopia in a Discipleship and Leadership development initiative over the next two years at a level of 20k.
- Dean Dunavan will be starting into the SMP (Specific Ministry Pastor)
 process in the fall.
- We were able to write a check to Feed My Starving Children for 50K.
- We are busy prepping for summer short term mission experiences.

TRANSFORMATIONAL MINISTRIES - \$4.5 Million

We will be faithful to the ongoing ministry of WLC so disciples will continue to be multiplied and transformed.

- Over the summer all three of our campuses will be hosting a variety of Kid's Camps designed to strengthen the faith of our Kids as well as Reach into our community.
- The Strategic Planning process is continuing to move forward and we are excited about the focus on Reach that God is placing on our hearts.

FOUNDATIONAL EXPENSES - \$1.7 Million

We will accelerate the payment of debt and make needed investments in our facilities so that we can effectively say "yes" to what God has in store for our future.

- Our debt is now under 1.7 million dollars.
- Both the Valley Creek and Oak Hill Sanctuaries are in the process of being updated.
- New monument signs have been installed on both the Oak Hill and Valley Creek Campuses.

Reaching Another Milestone

It was the end of an era as Delores Fitzgerald recently watched the last of the Eager Hands Quilters' supplies removed from her basement in her tidy Maplewood home.

This end came just after the productive, generous group donated its 6,000th quilt to the Salvation Army in downtown St. Paul. These quilts are distributed to homeless people who come in off the streets for shelter from the elements, a meal and a bed.

Donating 6,000 quilts is an astounding feat made all the more amazing when you learn the group also donates uncounted quilts for baby bags handed out by the Christian Closet, and also sends quilts with mission teams and disaster response teams for people around the globe.

It is said that for every door God closes, He opens another. With the move of the Christian Cupboard food shelf from the lower level of Woodbury Lutheran Church, space opened for a quilting room. So while Delores says goodbye to her basement quilting production room, and the Eager Hands Quilters say goodbye to their home for more than a decade, they are saying hello to their own new space.

And the goal to reach 7000 quilts is already set, "God willing," says octogenarian Delores.

For her, the move means no more climbing up and down her stairs to get ready for "her gals" as she calls them. It also means adjusting to not being able to sneak downstairs at all hours of the day or night to put a finishing touch on a

quilt that is almost ready for a recipient.

But the cookies will still be served, the machines will still be humming and the laughter will continue to flow as fast as the coffee.

And each quilt will also still include a special square that says, "Jesus Loves You."

It is the mark of a wonderful group of women long-committed to warming hearts as well as bodies in the name of Jesus Christ.

Botswana Meet the Beckendorfs

At noon on a Monday in March my wife Connie and I got through customs at the small airport in Maun, Botswana. We were greeted by Tim Beckendorf, who hosted us for 4 days. Tim and his wife Lisa arrived in Botswana in 2005. Their goal: learn the local language; reduce it to writing; and translate the Gospel for the Khwe (pronounced quay) people. In 2008 Woodbury Lutheran was introduced to Tim and his important work. Our church has been supporting them financially ever since.


Four hours north of Maun is the small cinder-block house where Tim and Lisa are raising their two sons. Their home is a 10-minute drive from the small village of Shakawe, in the northwest corner of the country.

The boys are homeschooled by their Mom. Aaron is a quiet, studious 13-year-old who creates faux websites on his computer to attract tourists to this exotic, far-away place. His 10-year-old brother Andrew is more animated. He smiled proudly as he showed us the knives he made. Both boys are bright and very polite; it was fun to get to know them a bit during our stay. They showed Connie and me the fort they built in an abandoned termite mound (easily 4 feet high), and took us into the woods surrounding their home looking for monkeys in the trees.

Jesus told His followers, "Go and make disciples of all nations..." (Matthew 28:19). Pastor Tim and Lisa are among the few who actually "go". They can "go" because of the generous support of folks like you; your giving provides funds for WLC's mission programs. WLC is playing an active role in bringing the Gospel to the Khwe people, helping to fulfill the

Great Commission. We Multiply Disciples and Transform Lives.





Deuteronomy: Covenant People

The title of the book of Deuteronomy in Hebrew simply means "these are the words." The book is largely filled with speeches from Israel's leader, Moses. With the Promise Land in sight, Moses knew his death was coming soon; in this fifth and final book of the Pentateuch, he shares his final words with the people of Israel. Moses' mission was simple and still speaks to us today: Let us prepare the next generation of Israelites to live as faithful servants of The Lord, their God.

Context of the book: As we journey through Deuteronomy, it is important to recall the combined narratives of Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, and Numbers which precede it. Consider again the motif that was laid out in Genesis during the 2014 summer series. The story pattern is:

Creation → Rebellion → Redemption → Restoration

In Genesis the story's focal point was on the good Creation and the Rebellion, with the promise given that YHWH will Redeem and Restore His good creation that has fallen under the curse of death. The Exodus then was centered squarely on the Redemption aspect of this motif. The Exodus of YHWH's people from Egypt into the Promised Land was a covenantal promise made by YHWH, foreshadowing the Redemption of Christ's Church into new life in Him. Leviticus is then set primarily in the motif aspect of Restoration (because of the Redemption). Leviticus deals with what it means to be the people of YHWH, in His presence. Numbers continues with how the people of Israel would live out the Redeemed and Restored relationship with YHWH. God shaped them all along the way, upholding his promises in his ways. Now, as they stand on the border of the Promised Land we see Moses reminding the people of their story as God's people, calling them to be faithful to the covenant of YHWH as they follow him.

Title: How Did We Get Here? Pt 1 Israel is Disciplined Through the Lord's Providence

Reading: Deuteronomy 2:1-7, 9, 16-19, 32, 37

Verse: Deuteronomy 2:7 2nd Reading: Luke 12:22-34

Focus: In his first speech of Deuteronomy, Moses dramatically tells the history of Israel's wandering. Because of their

disobedience, The Lord disciplined Israel in the wilderness for 40 years. Yet, the Lord never abandoned His people or failed to provide them with daily bread in their wanderings. Through Christ, The Lord continues to provide for all that

we need in our daily lives.

June 9 & 10, 2018 - Week 2

Title: How Did We Get Here? Pt 2 The Lord is Powerful, But Full of Mercy

Reading: Deuteronomy 3:1-6, 21-22; 4:1-4

Verse: Deuteronomy 3:5-6

2nd Reading: Luke 17:1-10

Focus: Wrapping up his first speech, Moses teaches Israel to fear horrifying power of The Lord, their God. He also warns

them to not be swayed away by idolatrous, foreign desires. We are still faced by idolatrous temptations today, but Christ has given us a community of disciples to help us remain humbly and obediently on the path of faithfulness.

June 16 & 17, 2018 - Week 3

Title: Israel's Constitutional Law: The Ten Commandments

Reading: Deuteronomy 5:6-21 Verse: Deuteronomy 5:10 2nd Reading: Matthew 22:34-40

Focus: As he begins his second speech, Moses reminds Israel of their covenantal or "constitutional" law. The Lord promises

to lavishly give His love to anyone who loves Him and obeys His commandments . Yet, it is humanly impossible to obey all the Commandments. In his love, Jesus comes to simplify and satisfy the commandments, giving us a

picture of what it means to follow God's law.

June 23 & 24, 2018 - Week 4

Title: The Great Shema: The Lord Our God, The Lord is One

Reading: Deuteronomy 6:1-15 Verse: Deuteronomy 6:6-7 2nd Reading: Matthew 19:13-15

Focus: The Lord declares that He One and there is no god beside Him. He calls his followers to commit to him whole-

heartedly. For Israel and for us, this means giving up our own way and following God. In exchange God astounds us by revealing himself in a clear way. In the Old Testament he did this through the sacrificial system, but in today he has revealed himself in Jesus. As he reveals himself God calls his followers past and present to pass on their faith to

the next generation.

June 30 & July 1, 2018 - Week 5

Title: The Privilege of Holiness: It's a Privilege, Not a Right

Reading: Deuteronomy 7:1-11 Verse: Deuteronomy 7:7-8 2nd Reading: Luke 1:68-75

Focus: Being chosen as the Lord's holy people is not a right, but a privilege. Israel did nothing to deserve it. God chose Israel

because he loved them and sought to reveal himself to the rest of the world through them. Jesus comes as the fulfillment of the promise made to Abraham. Though we have done nothing to deserve it, through Jesus sacrifice we

are made holy.

July 7 & 8, 2018 - Week 6

Title: Tithing: It's Much More Than Just a Law

Reading: Deuteronomy 14:22-29
Verse: Deuteronomy 14:26

2nd Reading: Luke 11:37-42

Focus: Like the Judaic Pharisees, for most people tithing has become purely about fulfilling the Law of Moses; however,

Jesus is not interested in you merely fulfilling a law. To Him, it is far more important that you would know why you are supposed to tithe: it is about *honoring* the name of The Lord and *celebrating* how He has provided for your every need. Through our thankful generosity, Jesus unleashes his power in us, in our relationships, in our community, and

in his world.

July 14 & 15, 2018 - Week 7

Title: Release for Debtors: Your Debt Has Already Been Paid

Reading: Deuteronomy 15:1-11 Verse: Deuteronomy 15:1-2

2nd Reading: Luke 4:14-24

Focus: In Deuteronomy 15, Moses reminds YHWH's command to cancel debts every seven years. Greed has always been a

problem for humans – it affects our lives and the way we treat others. Instead of trying to what others owe, Jesus demands that we selflessly share his Good News because he has already taken care of our every need – that even if you do not receive what is owed, Jesus has already taken care of your every need – just as He has done for them as

well.

July 21 & 22, 2018 - Week 8

Title: True and False Prophets: Even Preachers and Teachers Will be Held Accountable

Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-22 Verse: Deuteronomy 18:18

2nd Reading: John 8:21-31

Focus: The Lord promised that through Moses and others He would raise up leaders among the Israelites, that would speak

His truth while human leaders stumble and fall, Jesus comes to be the Ultimate Leader, bringing the full power and

truth of God to us.

July 28 & 29, 2018 - Week 9

Title: Laws Concerning Witnesses: There Must Always Be Two or Three

Reading: Deuteronomy 19:14-21
Verse: Deuteronomy 19:15

2nd Reading: John 8:12-20

Focus: The Law of the Torah demands that for someone to make an indictment, he or she needed to be accompanied by at

least two or three witnesses. The Pharisees tried to deny Jesus's personal testimony about Himself because of this law, but The Father also witnessed about His Son at the Baptism of Jesus (See Corinthians 15:6). How does the truth

about Jesus lead us to testify about what he has done?

August 4 & 5, 2108 - Week 10

Title: Those Excluded from the Congregation: All Are Welcome in His Temple

Reading: Deuteronomy 23:1-6 NKJV Verse: Deuteronomy 23:1-3 2nd Reading: Acts 8:26-40 NKJV

Focus: The Torah strictly forbade certain groups from entering into the temple and worshiping The Lord: those whom could

no longer receive the covenantal marker, those born outside of marriage, and those not faithful to The Lord's covenant. Through His apostle Philip, The Lord shows that no matter what someone how someone looks, how they were born, or their spiritual background, all people are able to receive the new covenantal marker as they are

baptized into Jesus' life, death and resurrection.

August 11 & 12, 2018 - Week 11

Title: Laws Concerning Divorce: Yes, It Is a Big Deal

Reading: Deuteronomy 24:1-4
Verse: Deuteronomy 24:1
2nd Reading: Matthew 19:1-12

Focus: The Torah left vague guidelines which, for generations, allowed men to abuse the Law and divorce their wives for

reasons as heartless as boredom. During His earthly ministry, Jesus strongly and publicly condemns this practice; and, instead calls for men and women of all generations to be faithful to one another in their marital vows, just as

The Lord is faithful to His covenantal vow.

August 18 & 19, 2018 - Week 12

Title: The Covenant Renewal: Yesterday, Today, and Forever

Reading: Deuteronomy 29:9-21

Verse: Deuteronomy 29:14-15

2nd Reading: Matthew 5:17-20

Focus: The Lord renews His covenant with Israel and promises to remain faithful to it for all future generations of followers,

which means that, even today, you and I remain legally bound to His Covenantal Law; however, as a testament to His faithfulness, The Lord sent His Son, Jesus, to satisfy the righteous judgments and sacrificial demands on our

behalf when we fall short of His Law.

August 25 & 26, 2018 - Week 13

Title: The Death of Moses: His Work is Not Finished

Reading: Deuteronomy 34:1-12 Verse: Deuteronomy 34:4 2nd Reading: Matthew 17:1-13


Focus: Even though he was forbidden from entering the Promise Land, The Lord showed mercy to Moses and allowed him
