Jesus Wept!

"Then **Jesus wept**. The people who were standing nearby said, "See how much he loved him!" -- John 11:35-36

In John 11 we read about the amazing account of the death of Lazarus and Jesus raising him back to life. This text is rich with lessons about the identity of Jesus and His call to follow Him, but another lesson that is sometimes missed is the need and freedom to mourn and grieve. As a kid I would always joke about the shortest verse in the Bible, "Jesus Wept" because it was a really easy verse to memorize, little did I know just how powerful that verse actually is.

Imagine, Jesus weeping, not just crying, but weeping because His friend has died. What I find so amazing is that He is weeping full well knowing that He will be able to raise him back to life in a few short moments. So the big question is why would Jesus weep if in a few short minutes He was going to raise Lazarus back to life?

I believe that answer is that grief and mourning are an important part of who we are as human beings and it is only after admitting this that we can deal with it in a healthy manner.

Our church is experiencing incredible transition; not long ago Pastor Drew and Pastor Derek were moved by the Spirit to new ministries. More recently our Minister of Music of 28 years Mark Shepperd retired, Dan and Barb Arend who were on staff for over 20 years retired, Pastor Nadasdy retired as our District President and Pastor Deane Schuessler was called home to be with Jesus.

Let that soak in for a moment... and if you need to weep, that is ok! Change is hard, transition is challenging and there needs to be room for grief and mourning, but if we don't name that, our grief will come out sideways; in anger, in gossip and in other hurtful ways. During this time in the life of our church, we need to take time to grieve, we need to be patient with one another, and most of all we need to focus on Jesus the One who is the same yesterday, today and forever.

When we grieve properly, then something amazing happens, like when Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead. He brings new life to us in the midst of our grief. In Psalm 30:5 we read these great words, "Weeping may last through the night, but joy comes with the morning."

Friends, my prayer for each of you is that during this time of change WE can grieve well TOGETHER, knowing that God is always busy doing new things and that joy will be coming in the morning.

Final sermon of:

Rev. Dr. Deane Schuessler to the Japanese Lutheran Church, based on Psalm 34

Are You Proud of Your Lord God?

There are basically two parts to our relationship with God: PRAISE & PRAYER. PRAISE is centered in what God has done for us, as our Creator; in Jesus' death and resurrection to give us what we need most of all: the gift of forgiveness, life, and salvation, and the Holy Spirit who conveys God's Word, and the gift of faith. PRAISE centers in all God does for us. When we come to faith, we are responding to what Godhas done for us, with God bringing the Good News of Jesus to forgive us, and to grant us eternal life as a total gift. Of the two, PRAISE is by far the most important part in our relationship with God.

PRAYER, is second to PRAISE. BUT PRAYER is mostly asking God for help. Let's talk about God's initiative, which we acknowledge God by faith. First let's talk about PRAISE we know that God is center of our relationship with God. Then later, we'll talk about what God teaching us to PRAY.

I'm going to jog your memory. I'm going to ask two of you to help. First, I am asking all of you to think of a time when you had a fairly difficult problem. You knew you needed help, so you prayed to God to help you. He did, either in the way you imagined He would, OR in a way different from how you imagined He would. Now, would one of you be willing to tell us your story? Now, do you feel proud of God, and thankful for helping you?

All of you heard the story. Now, I'd like to ask one of you to tell us HOW listening to that person's story help us grow our faith and trust in God. I'd like to ask HOW hearing what you heard benefits your faith, hope, and joy in Christ.

In our Psalm 34, verses 2 and 3, this process is described in these words: "My soul will boast in the Lord; let the afflicted hear and rejoice."Let's thank both of these folks who helped us all by saying to them "THANK YOU!" When we are proud of God like these two folks, for being willing to speak out about what God has done for them showed courage, and stimulated us to trust God. When you told us you are proud of God, you stimulated us to be proud of God ourselves. When we are proud of someone, and we express it in words, that helps build all of our faith and our relationship with God. And it helps take away some of our fear. This process is described in Psalm 34, verses 1 to 3, as follows: "I will extol the Lord at all times; his praise will always be on my lips. My soul will boast in the Lord; let the afflicted hear and rejoice. Glorify the Lord with me and let us exalt his name together. I sought the Lord and He answered me; He delivered me from all my fears."

This Psalm 34 has helped me more times than I can remember, especially verses 17

and 18: "The righteous (anyone who trusts God from his heart, God says that that person is a righteous person. Listen to these two verses 17 and 18, "The righteous cry out and the Lord hears them; God delivers them from all their troubles. The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."

Every time I hear these words, my embarrassment melts, and my fears shrink down to proper size. It's not that my good deeds turn me into a righteous person. It's just that God forgives my sins, and transforms me into a person who trusts God. And so God declares that He accepts such a person as righteous in His eyes, a true believer. And so God declares that person as true and acceptable in His (God's) eyes. Let me add verse 19: "A righteous man may have many troubles, but the Lord rescues him or her from them all; God protects all his bones, not one of them will be broken."

We never need to be embarrassed to pray to God. It's a natural thing when we share with others how God has helped us, and so we don't need to be afraid to express praise to God. We all need God's help every day. So God admits that He is happy to use such people as His representatives. And so God's word spreads to more and more people who are not afraid to admit that our God is the true and merciful God of the universe. Like with the two folks who helped us at the beginning of this message, who helped us to do that.

We're not afraid to admit that God doesn't "wash us out" as His representatives because we experience difficulties from time to time. Actually it's better this way, because our goal is not for us to get people to be impressed by us, but to give full credit to God Himself instead of us. We are the Lord's imperfect, but very humble and thankful servants, who love to praise Him.

Now the second part, about PRAYING TO GOD. As I said before, we need to have a totally God-centered prayer life. In our Psalm 34, God gives us a caution about praying to Him. Beginning with verse 15, we read: "The eyes of the Lord are on the righteous and His ears are attentive to their cry; the face of the Lord is against those who do evil, to cut off the memory of them from the earth. The righteous cry out, and the Lord hears them; he delivers them from all their problems."

So you see that we need to be God-centered, not self-centered as we think of ourselves and our needs. So, let us concentrate n putting God totally in the center of our faith and life, with ourselves in second place.

ing.

THE RESERVE TO SERVE TO SERVE

Pastor Ben Griffin, along with dozens

of WLC members, was sent to Cottage Grove to start The Alley church in September 2007. After three years of subsidies, The Alley became a recognized LCMS congregation and recently spun off another church plant.

Outdoor worship on the St. Croix "Campus" began in the summer of 2007. That same year, the lower level of the Valley Creek building was finished, along with The Bridge youth space next to the Genesis room. Plenty of new outdoor and indoor spaces!

Risen Christ Church of Stillwater approached WLC to propose a merger in 2012. Pastor Derek Broten, newly minted from a special seminary program, gathered dozens of Valley Creek members and proceeded to bring new life to the church that became the Oak Hill Campus.

Just last year, the Liberty Ridge

Campus began worshiping under the leadership of Pastor Jon Kuehne. This neighborhood church meets in the Liberty Ridge Elementary School, in the middle of the Stone Mill Farms development. It takes a lot of volunteers to set up each Sunday, lead worship, and pack up before school starts on Monday.





An Update On Multiply

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." - Acts 1:8

2018 is off to a strong start financially around the *Multiply* initiative, but it is important to remember that *Multiply* is a two year 8.4 million dollar initiative that includes everything in our budget. Remember *Multiply* is a one fund, meaning that everything we do ministry wise is included in *Multiply*.

Here are a few updates from each bucket:

MULTISITE INVESTMENT - \$1.1 Million

We will be proactive in using the blessings God has given us to multiply new campuses for His glory.

- We continue to pay the operating expenses of Liberty Ridge and Oak Hill.
- We are setting aside funds for future multisite ministry as well as for a future permanent location for Liberty Ridge.
- God is continuing to open doors for conversations that could lead to new ministry sites for WLC.

FOCUSED MISSIONS - \$1.1 Million

We will support the work of God's Kingdom by multiplying new church plants and leaders, partnering with developing communities and feeding the hunary.

- We are excited to be partnering with the Makane Yesus Lutheran Church in Ethiopia in a Discipleship and Leadership development initiative over the next two years at a level of 20k.
- We are excited to be a part of sending the Moody Family through WMPL as missionaries to an unreached part of the world.
- We are now supporting 4 men in Ethiopia receive training that will culminate with them planting new churches in the Addis Ababa area.

TRANSFORMATIONAL MINISTRIES - \$4.5 Million

We will be faithful to the ongoing ministry of WLC so disciples will continue to be multiplied and transformed.

- Over the summer all three of our campuses hosted a variety of Kid's Camps designed to strengthen the faith of our Kids as well as Reach into our community.
- The Strategic Planning process is continuing to move forward and we are excited about the focus on Reach that God is placing on our hearts.

FOUNDATIONAL EXPENSES - \$1.7 Million

We will accelerate the payment of debt and make needed investments in our facilities so that we can effectively say "yes" to what God has in store for our future.

- Our debt is now under 1.7 million dollars.
- Both the Valley Creek and Oak Hill Sanctuaries have been updated.
- The last part of the roof at Valley Creek will be replaced this summer yay!

If your 6th-12th grader isn't registered yet, please go to wlcyouth.org!



Be Disaster Ready!

LERT (Lutheran Early Response Team) Training September 29, 8:30 am - 4 pm Valley Creek Campus

We at Woodbury Lutheran have a heart for those who have lost everything to natural disaster and a long history in disaster response. Disaster response in our church is the delivery of help in times of trouble, but more importantly, bringing Christ's mercy to those in desperate need.

Natural disasters continue to plague our nation at a rapid and unprecedented pace. Much help is needed on many fronts, even a year or more after the incident has passed. We want our congregation to be prepared to step up when called and that means preparing individuals and teams for quick and effective response and to commit to disasters for the long haul.

So, we are sponsoring Lutheran Disaster Response training to help you prepare for disaster response far away or in our own community.

The 7-hour training will be facilitated by a certified disaster response trainer for the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod Disaster Response organization. Participants will become confident in the call to respond, and will receive a certificate of participation, a workbook, volun-

teer credentials and a safety vest.

Morning coffee, lunch and a short afternoon break will be provided to all registrants. We are sorry we cannot accommodate special dietary requirements and ask that you bring your own food if you have dietary needs such as gluten-free or vegetarian.

A seven-day mission trip to the Corpus Christi area is scheduled for October 14-21. There work continues to bring help to those ravaged by Hurricane Harvey last summer. Team members do not have to be members of Woodbury Lutheran or the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod to participate.

Priority will be given to people who complete this day-long training. This is a great opportunity to join an established team under experienced leaders, and to put your new found knowledge to work!

Short Term Mission Experience Quito, Ecuador

Our team of 12 traveled to Quito July 6th-17th. God continues to build relationships and do amazing things between WLC and the people who dwell in Ecuador. It was wonderful to see people we know again and build new friendships as well. About half of our team had been to Ecuador in the past. Once again, we partnered with Casa Gabriel, a training ministry for street boys, and Casa Adalia, a home for girls who have been sex trafficked or are at risk for being trafficked. Hannah (Miller) Zook, is the social worker at Casa Adalia.

To help us to get acclimated to being at 10,000 ft above sea level, we spent the first day walking around the city, visited a cathedral, and took a gondola ride up to hike around the mountain with some of the Casa G boys. This was a great way to build relationships with them and to learn more about Ecuadorian culture.

Our first work project came the next day when we traveled 2 1/2 hours outside of Quito with some of the Casa G boys to a poor indigenous mountain community called Gualsaqui. While there, we partnered with a local pastor and 3 of his congregational members to lay a cement floor in what will be a kitchen for the church to serve the community. We shoveled gravel, collected rocks, laid them as the foundation, and made the cement mixture

the Ecuadorian way. It was incredible to help them do this in the way they know how, not how we would necessarily go about it. This is a great part of learning about different cultures! While some of us continued to work on the flooring, another part of our team and some of the Casa G boys spent time with local kids in a field play-

ing all kinds of fun games. It was a wonderful day filled with great memories.

We spent 3 days working on different projects at Casa A ranging from repairing walls and floors, painting, cleaning, hanging new curtains, and yard work. Culturally in Ecuador, building relationships is more important than projects. We also played with the kids of Casa A so that their moms could attend classes or appointments. We were blessed by listening to testimonies of 2 of the women of Casa A and 2 of the boys of Casa G, along with 2 members of our team. 3 members of our team conducted training sessions for staff and some of the residents of Casa A and G on Spiritual Gifts Inventory, Childhood Trauma, and Moms In Prayer Ministry.

Other ways we built relationships was we attended worship together, watched the World Cup Soccer final game together, played soccer, ate meals, prayed, and danced together. What a joy it was to be with them again, and we look forward to continuing our partnership with Casa Gabriel and Casa Adalia.

Woodbury Lutheran Church has joined with the City of Woodbury, local churches, schools and businesses to pack 5 million meals for starving children around the world. From October 4-7, you, along with 25,000 of your friends and neighbors will have the opportunity to participate in the largest FMSC mobile packing event to be held at Health-East Sports Center. Adults and children will measure and scoop ingredients, seal bags and prepare boxes for shipping. Children as young as five can also help as long as they are with a parent/adult. If you are a leader of an organization that would like to participate (Scouts, etc.) then the minimum age is third grade.

An exciting aspect of this year's MobilPack is that 10% of the funds raised will go directly to the Christian Cupboard Emergency Food Shelf (CCEFS). So in addition to packing for hungry children around the world we will be helping to feed the hungry right here in Woodbury. Registration is now open via the volunteer link found at FiveMillion-Meals.org or at FMSC.org. Each packing session is 2 hours and the packing times are the same on all four days: 9-11 am, 12-2 pm, 3-5 pm and 6-8:30 pm. And you can pack as often as you would like - just remember to register for each session.

The local praise bank "Seventh Hour" will be kicking off the event with a concert Wednesday evening, October 3rd, at the HealthEast Sports Center. There will also be a variety of food trucks available for your enjoyment.


Sermon Series for September Love Where You Live

A Man Named Martin

Over the last two years, we have gone through two parts of a series called A Man Named Martin. This September, we will have an opportunity to dig in to the third and final installment in the series. From Luther's 95 Theses in 1517 to the Peace of Westphalia in 1648. God was at work in the Reformation. Fierce debates over Scripture, church doctrine, and late medieval church practice led to theological positions articulating salvation as God's grace in action, with man being left to add nothing to his own salvation. In A Man Named Martin - Part 3: **The Movement.** viewers will see how the Reformation transformed European society and, eventually, left a profound impression around the globe.

A Man Named Martin - Part 3: The Movement will show how the Reformation accelerated the transformation of a world already in flux. While armed conflicts, theological disputes, and heated controversies marked segments of society throughout medieval Europe, the march of the Reformation left its imprint on the face of culture and citizen alike. Everything from education, politics, science, theology, marriage, and the family-and even extending to one's view of vocation and his relationship to God-came under the shaping and seminal influence of the Reformation.

European politics changed in that state-to-state relationships were increasingly governed by political concepts of state and not by notions of Christendom. Ultimatelv. the Reformation contributed a number of ideas that traveled across the Atlantic which, in turn, influenced our Republic via ideas of individual rights and representative democracy. According to Rev. Dr. Gregory Seltz, program host and Speaker for The Lutheran Hour, "The greatest thing about the Reformation are the solas: grace alone, faith alone, Christ alone, Scripture alone because, in reality, what it does is it establishes the worth of a human being before God in a way that can't be done by people; it's done by God in Jesus Christ." Not-So-Random Acts of Kindness

Random acts of kindness! You've heard that phrase, I'm sure. It was first introduced in our culture a few years ago. Or was it? It seems to me the concept of serving actually dates back to the beginning of time, and if you dig into Scripture, I think you'll agree.

As Christians we are to serve one another by using our gifts, and we're to do so with our whole heart according to verses like Galatians 5:13, Ephesians 6:7, and 1 Peter 4:10.

One of my favorite biblical examples of self-sacrificing service involves a little boy and his lunch. I'm sure he packed only enough for himself that day, but he saw a need and willingly gave his lunch so Jesus could feed the throng of hungry people. Can you imagine that little boy's joy as he watched what happened that day?

Unfortunately, in today's self-absorbed world, a more selfish mentality is the norm. Whether we're five or fifty-five, we are often blinded to the needs of others by our inability to see beyond ourselves. It's all about me! What do I want to do? What's in it for me? Where do I want to go?

American writer Dale Carnegie once said this: "The world is so full of people who are grabbing and self-seeking, so the rare individual who unselfishly tries to serve others has an enormous advantage. He has little competition!" Sadly, that is so true today.

As grandparents, we can (and should) do all we can to counteract that selfish mentality and instill in our grandchildren a desire to serve—to perform random acts of kindness. The great thing is kids are often eager to serve, as was the case of the little boy with the lunch. Especially with a little encouragement and creativity from a grandparent!

Let's challenge ourselves and our grandchildren to serve others this month. Let's ask the Lord to help us become sensitive to the needs of people around us, to get rid of blinders, and to see people through His eyes.

Whether your grandchildren live next door or 200 miles away, brainstorm with them about whom you can help and how. Make a list and add to it throughout the month. Every day, in every situation, ask yourself what needs to be done—then just do it.

My grandkids and I have already thought of a few easy ideas:

- Mow grass, rake leaves, or pull weeds for a neighbor
- · Visit someone in the hospital or nursing home
- Bake cookies for your firefighters and police officers
- Hold the door open for someone and greet her with a smile
- Send a card or write a letter
- · Fill a shoebox for Operation Christmas Child
- · Pick some flowers for someone

Record every act of kindness you do and have your grandchildren do the same (if they're doing this challenge long distance). At the end of the month, discuss the experience.

- What did you learn?
- · How many acts of service did you provide?
- Are you more aware of the needs of others than you were before?
- How did people react to being served?
- Was it fun? Were there any surprises?
- Would you do it again?

We're all in! How about you? May your "September of Serving" be a blessing as you encourage your grands to see beyond themselves and generously give themselves in service to others!
